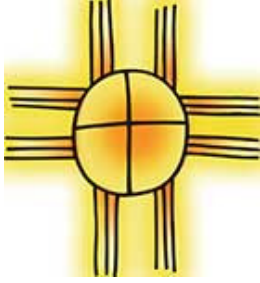

Pastor's Message



A blessed New Year to you!

It's January and the beginning of a new calendar year. It's a good time to take a moment to both reflect and dream; to take a look back to get a lay of the land and to look forward to lay the groundwork for what is next.

I have been a pastor among you for seven months. I have experienced the vibrancy of this congregation, the commitment of both individuals and groups, and the warm community that spans generations. I am continually astonished at what is being done and how many of you actively participate in so many areas of ministry.

Some of that participation is accomplished within committees. We could not exist without the faithful work of those who steward our finances, those who make sure all that is needed for vibrant worship and music happens, those who commit themselves to fulfilling our baptismal promises to our children of all ages to support them as they grow in faith. And that's just the tip of the iceberg.

Besides committees, there are other groups who faithfully live out their call and thus help us live out our collective call as God's people. There are quilt-makers and prayer-shawl knitters. There are those who cook and serve dinner at Compass Housing Alliance. There are the men who gather monthly to rake leaves and take care of the building. There are members of the altar guild who make sure all is set so we can be fed not only by Word but also in the sacraments. There are those who take communion to our members who cannot attend worship. Worship assistants and readers and acolytes serve us each and every Sunday. And yes, I know this is only a partial list too.

But on top of all of these established, institutional forms of ministry, I have become aware that there are less formalized ways of living out our faith going on too. Quite a number of you quietly visit those in our community whom you know could use some company. When fellowship events come up, individuals step up and join a team to make it happen. A member knows the need in the homeless community for warm clothing, and so helps make a collection happen. Again, this is just a sampling of all that is going on.

It seems to me that there is a shift happening in our community, and it matches a shift happening in many mainline congregations. We live out our faith in multiple ways and not always within the confines of a particular committee. We may be entering a time when we need to look at how we are being faithful and celebrate the new forms that are emerging. We may discover a new way of organizing our ministries, based on how we are actually functioning rather than on the ways churches have traditionally been structured.

What will that look like? That's not yet clear. But what is clear is that some new way of being church seems to be emerging without our even intending it to. The church is not a static institution. It is a gathering of people seeking to follow Jesus. It is dynamic and alive because it consists of people. And the process of unfolding is an iterative one. As we move into this new year and begin to examine whether there is consistency between how we actually function and how we are structured, we'll need to be patient. I do sense the Spirit at work, but God's timetable is not always our timetable.

So, here's my invitation to you as you begin this new year. Take some time to listen to where your passion really lies. Even if you have been on the same committee for 25 years, it doesn't mean that that's where God wants you now. Do you have a heart for showing hospitality to strangers? Do you have a passion for social justice? Do you have the gift of being a good listener? Are you antsy about opening our doors to those who don't look and act like us, who haven't been here generation after generation? Would you love to help create more color and beauty in the sanctuary? Do you just love helping make those potlucks happen? Do you have a passion for...(you fill in the blank)?

Take some time. Think outside the old box. Trust God's ever-unfolding call on your life, both within and outside these walls. It might feel a bit like a fruit-basket upset. But that might be a bit fun too. God is at work. Trust that, boldly claim your particular call and then let's have conversations and see how things fall together in new ways.

Thoughts From Your Director Of Music

“Shepherds, rejoice! lift up your eyes And send your fears away; News from the region of the skies: Salvation's born today! Jesus, the God whom angels fear, Comes down to dwell with you; Today he makes his entrance here, But not as monarchs do. 'No gold, nor purple swaddling bands, Nor royal shining things; A manger for his cradle stands, And holds the King of kings. Go, shepherds, where the Infant lies, And see his humble throne; With tears of joy in all your eyes, Go, shepherds, kiss the Son.’” Isaac Watts

The above are two verses from one of my most favorite Christmas Carols, a rather unusual one. This wonderful text of Isaac Watts was set by the great Early American composer, William Billings, one of the Faith Lutheran Choir's most favorite composers. As I write this, I have the music on a continuous loop. I am also writing this on the day of our Christmas Pageant, which is traditionally a day of great joy and smiles and tears.

The tears come from many places and for many reasons, of course. For some, this day brings a day of watching the growth in your children, especially as can be easily marked from the year before, as your children enter into new roles in the pageant. There is the joy in sharing once again this treasured story, the root of our faith in Christ. For some, this is a day of tears for the memories of those not with us to share this day this year. For others, this is a day when we share the joy of being able to be one with our body in Christ, the fellowship that brings us out of the sometimes darker days of our lives. Pastor Ostrem reminded us of the darkness of the season this morning as she mentioned the longest night service, and for many of us, those dark days seem unending and bleak, and our tears well up at times for no particular reason that we can identify.

Isaac Watts reminds us that Christ burst into our human lives, as human himself. As shepherds, we leave our hard work, our sadness, our trouble, and our fear, to the side for a bit as we come to greet the one who can bring us through all of our tears and into the glorious presence of God, revealed in a way that we can finally comprehend...one of us yet also God. This is a story beyond believing and also the root of all believing.

I have tears this season for all the reasons I have listed above...joy to see our children and young people growing in faith, sharing the powerful story with all of you, missing dear friends and family, some newly lost and some who have lived with Christ for a long time now. But mostly, I have tears of joy, as I rush forward to greet God's son, whose love is beyond all human measure, so greatly needed by me, which can fill my heart beyond its capacity and bring me into a new life once again. “Rejoice! Lift up your eyes and send your fears away! Salvation's born today!”

A Word From The Bishop

You will be electing members to the 2012 Synod Assembly in the coming months. I know that some of you have elections in the fall, but most elect at meetings in January and February. The theme and activities for this year's assembly are being developed as I write this. This much is known. Mark Allen Powell from Trinity Seminary, Columbus, Ohio, will be our speaker. His presentations will focus on the *Lutheran use of scripture in the 21st century*. This year's assembly will also focus on selecting leaders for the future. One half of the Synod Council will be elected. The position of treasurer could be elected or we could adopt a constitutional amendment that would make the treasurer's position a position elected by the Synod Council. We will be electing a secretary to fill an unexpired term. We will elect ten members for the 2013 ELCA Churchwide Assembly in Pittsburg, Penn. These members will have the usual duties of assembly members, but will also be casting ballots for the Presiding Bishop and the Secretary of the ELCA. Now is the time to begin thinking about who you would like to lead us on the Synod Council and who should be our representatives at the churchwide assembly. We are calling people to serve in these offices and positions. We should be praying for them even as we select them. It is also time to submit nominations for those whom we would like to see serve in these positions. In this synod it is permissible to nominate oneself if that seems to be a place where you might serve the church. It is also the time to be thinking about the resolutions you would like the synod assembly to consider. Recently we have seen resolutions arrive at the last minute at the assembly. It is more helpful, and it guarantees that the resolution will be acted upon, if these resolutions are submitted by the deadline of March 1. I encourage clusters to meet as the members to the Synod Assembly are chosen to discuss the resolutions and to share ideas about who should lead us into the future. For some the Synod Assembly is not what you think about in January. It is my conviction that we do our best work when we plan for the assembly and when everyone knows what is coming to the assembly so that we have opportunity to talk with others about the decisions that will be made. This synod is continuing to reach out with new and renewing ministries. We are preparing leaders for the future on all of the rosters of the church. It is through the leadership of the Assembly, Synod Council and churchwide assembly that this work is supported and governed. I invite your prayers and thoughtful preparation as you elect those who will serve.

Epiphany: a manifestation or appearance; a realization; the liturgical season lasting from January 6th until Lent. The season of Epiphany begins with January 6th, and it is the day in which we celebrate the wise men finding the baby Jesus.

- #1. *To observe (a day) or commemorate (an event) with ceremonies or festivities.*
- #2. *To make known publicly; proclaim.*
- #3. *To praise widely or to present to widespread and favorable public notice, as through newspapers, novels, etc.” (i.e., Church newsletters)*
- #4. *To perform with appropriate rites and ceremonies; solemnize.*
- #5. *To observe a day or commemorate an event with ceremonies or festivities.*
- #6. *To perform a religious ceremony. (from the Latin meaning “often repeated, famous.”) Synonym for definition #1 above: “commemorate, honor, solemnize.” Synonym for definition #3 above: “Laud, glorify.”*

THE SHAREHOUSE

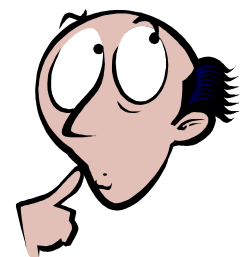
What does sharing and giving have to do with landfills? That tidbit of information can be found by investigating our giving emphasis for January: The Sharehouse. The Sharehouse's mission is to assist folks transitioning from homelessness to permanent house, and to also protect our environment by distributing useful household items that might otherwise be discarded. The Sharehouse works with over 60 agencies in King County that provide services to the homeless, and furnishes approximately 2000 newly established households each year. And while doing these acts of mercy, The Sharehouse keeps more than 12,000 items out of area landfills each year.

The Sharehouse welcomes donations of furniture (mattresses, bed frames, tables, dressers, etc.) linens (sheets, blankets, etc.) kitchen and dining items (pots and pans, dishes, flatware, etc.), area rugs, hairdryers, lamps, light bulbs, cleaning supplies (brooms, detergent, new and unopened hygiene products, etc.) and so forth. All items must be in good working condition. Their website is very informative and the completed list of goods accepted is quite exhaustive. Check The Sharehouse out at www.thesharehouse.org. The phone number is 206-767-5280.

Do you have a toaster oven in a cupboard somewhere because even though you thought you'd use it all the time, you don't? Or what about that comforter that great aunt Mildred gave to you that really isn't your cup of tea? How about that little TV in the spare room that no one has watched in the last 10 years? Maybe you are just trying to simplify. Think about The Sharehouse!

BONUS FACTOID: There is a community information line handily reached by dialing 2-1-1 that is a clearinghouse of information about health and human services in King County. This is a database that has comprehensive information about agencies that accept furniture and other household items. So if The Sharehouse can not accept your donation, perhaps another agency would welcome your gift. The website is www.kingcounty.org.

Internationally known as a Biblical and Jesus scholar, Marcus Borg is described by the New York Times as “a leading figure in his generation of Jesus Scholars.” He has made numerous television appearances including NBC’s “Today Show,” “Dateline,” PBS’s “News Hour” and ABC’s “Evening News.”
