LIGHTING of the ADVENT WREATH

One of the best-known customs for the season is the Advent wreath. The wreath and winter candle-lighting in the midst of growing darkness strengthen some of the Advent images found in the Bible. The unbroken circle of greens is clearly an image of everlasting life, a victory wreath, the crown of Christ, or the wheel of time itself. Christians use the wreath as a sign that Christ reaches into our time to lead us to the light of everlasting life. The four candles mark the progress of the four weeks of Advent and the growth of light. Sometimes the wreath is embellished with natural dried flowers or fruit. Its evergreen branches lead the household and the congregation to the evergreen Christmas tree. In many homes, people gather for prayers around the wreath.

In a world full of hurt, we see glimmers of joy. We see glimmers of joy in birthday candles and homemade cards. We see joy in the laughter of children and the delight of grandparents. Introductory Reading:

The first Noel, the angel did say was to certain poor shepherds in fields as they lay; in fields where they lay, keeping their sheep, on a cold winter's night that was so deep, Noel, Noel, Noel! Born is the King of Israel! (The First Noel, English Traditional)

Reading 1 We Tell the Story From the Gospel of Luke

Today we hear the story of a baby born in a manger long ago, a child born among the poor. We tell this story year after year because this child was Emmanuel, which means "God with us." The people of that time were waiting for a king to come to help them. But no one expected God to send a baby to show how much God loves each of us and the whole world. And that is good news to hear over and over again!

Reading 2 God's Message to Mary

We begin our story when the angel Gabriel was sent by God to a town in Galilee called Nazareth, to the Virgin Mary who was engaged to a man named Joseph, of the house of David.

Gabriel said to Mary, "Greetings, favored one! The Lord is with you." But she was confused by his words and pondered what sort of greeting this might be. The angel said to her, "Do not be afraid, Mary, for you have found favor with God. And now, you will conceive in your womb and bear a son, and you will name him Jesus. He will be great, and will be called the Son of the Most High, and the Lord God will give to him the throne of his ancestor David. He will reign over the house of Jacob forever, and of his kingdom there will be no end."

Reading 3 Mary's Response

Mary said to the angel, "How can this be, since I am a virgin?"




Then Mary said, "Here am I, the servant of the Lord; let it be with me according to your word."


Then the angel departed from her.


Mary travelled to the hill country to see her cousin Elizabeth, who asked, "...why has this happened to me that the mother of my Lord comes to me?"






















Reading 4 Joseph and Mary Travel



Reading 5 The Shepherds Hear the Good News

In that region there were shepherds living in the fields, keeping watch over their flock by night. Then an angel of the Lord stood before them and the glory of the Lord shone around them, and they were terrified. But the angel said to them, "Do not be afraid; for see—I am bringing you good news of great joy for all the people: to you is born this day in the city of David a Savior, who is the Messiah, the Lord. This will be a sign for you: you will find a child wrapped in bands of cloth and lying in a manger."

And suddenly there was with the angel a multitude of the heavenly hosts praising God and saying, "Glory to God in the highest heaven, and on earth peace among those whom he favors."

Go, tell it on the mountain that Jesus Christ is born!

While shepherds kept their watching o'er silent flocks by night,

Reading 6 The Shepherds Go to the Manger

When the angels had left them and gone into heaven, the shepherds said to one another, "Let us go now to Bethlehem and see this thing that has taken place, which the Lord has made known to us." So they went with haste and found Mary and Joseph, and the child lying in the manger.

When the shepherds saw the baby in the manger, they made known what been told them about this child, and all who heard it were amazed. But Mary treasured all these words and pondered them in her heart. The shepherds returned, glorifying and praising God for all they had heard and seen, as it had been told them.

Reading 7 News of the Birth and the Wise Magi

A few years later, in the time of King Herod, Wise Persons who watched the night skies saw a brilliant new star and knew this foretold the birth of a king. Sometime later, they came to Jerusalem asking, "Where is the child who has been born king of the Jews? For we observed his star at its rising, and have come to honor him."

News of the birth of a new king frightened King Herod, and he sent the Wise Persons to find the child.

Reading 8 The Wise Persons at the Manger

And so the magi journeyed to Bethlehem, following the star until it stopped over the place where Jesus was.

We the kings of Orient are; bearing gifts we traverse afar, Field and fountain, moor and mountain, following yonder star.

Refrain: O, star of wonder, star of light, star with royal beauty bright,
Westward leading, still proceeding, guide us to thy perfect light.

When they saw that the star had stopped, they were overwhelmed with joy. On entering the house, they saw the child with his mother Mary, and they knelt down and honored him. Then, opening their treasure chests, they offered gifts of gold, and also frankincense and myrrh, which were a kind of incense and perfume.

And having been warned in a dream not to return to Herod, they left for their own country by another road.

Reading 9

This is not the end of the story, but just the beginning of how God comes to us in Jesus, the Christ, Emmanuel, God with Us. As we learn in the stories of the New Testament, Jesus grows up to be a young man who teaches a new way of living in God's grace: how to love one another, to care for the poor, to share what we have, and to live together in peace. We remember the holiness of the night that started it all when we sing:

*Worship Notes: This morning's Call to Worship references Advent through the composer's use of the pastorale style, which evokes the image of "shepherds keeping watch over their flocks," while the text of the chorale reflects the believer as one of the Great Shepherd's flock. The closing measures include a fragment of STILLE NACHT (ELW 281), further underlining the hymn's relevance to the season. Sigfrid Karg-Elert, a master colorist of the German Romantic era, showcases the richness of our organ's voices through lush harmonies, a standard feature of Karg-Elert's musical language.

In the Offertory, **Domenico Zipoli**'s *Pastorale* continues the theme of the shepherds' unwitting anticipation of the Savior's birth, as they play their flutes in a call and response across the hills, and briefly dance in the central section of the piece. Zipoli's tone painting includes the braying of a donkey, which may reflect the passage of Mary and Joseph on their way to Bethlehem.




