FIRST READING Proverbs 25:6-7a

The book of Proverbs is part of a collection of writings known as wisdom literature. Wisdom literature gave directions to Israel's leaders and people for the conduct of daily life. Today's reading is about humility.

Do not put yourself forward in the king's presence or stand in the place of the great, for it is better to be told, "Come up here," than to be put lower in the presence of a noble, what your eyes have seen.

SECOND READING Hebrews 13:1-8, 15-16

The conclusion of the letter to the Hebrews contains suggestions for the conduct of a holy life, all of which are shaped by God's love toward us in Jesus Christ.

Let mutual affection continue. Do not neglect to show hospitality to strangers, for by doing that some have entertained angels without knowing it. Remember those who are in prison, as though you were in prison with them, those who are being tortured, as though you yourselves were being tortured. Let marriage be held in honor by all, and let the marriage bed be kept undefiled, for God will judge the sexually immoral and adulterers. Keep your lives free from the love of money, and be content with what you have, for he himself has said, "I will never leave you or forsake you." So we can say with confidence,

"The Lord is my helper; I will not be afraid. What can anyone do to me?"

Remember your leaders, those who spoke the word of God to you; consider the outcome of their way of life, and imitate their faith. Jesus Christ is the same yesterday and today and forever.

Through him, then, let us continually offer a sacrifice of praise to God, that is, the fruit of lips that confess his name. Do not neglect to do good and to share what you have, for such sacrifices are pleasing to God.

GOSPEL Luke 14:1, 7-14

Jesus observes guests jockeying for position at the table. He uses the opportunity to teach his hearers to choose humility rather than self-exaltation. Jesus also makes an appeal for hosts to imitate God's gracious hospitality to those in need.

The Holy Gospel according to St. Luke the 14th Chapter. **Glory to you, O Lord.**


On one occasion when Jesus was going to the house of a leader of the Pharisees to eat a meal on the Sabbath, they were watching him closely.

When he noticed how the guests chose the places of honor, he told them a parable. "When you are invited by someone to a wedding banquet, do not sit down at the place of honor, in case someone more distinguished than you has been invited by your host, and the host who invited both of you may come and say to you, 'Give this person your place,' and then in disgrace you would start to take the lowest place. But when you are invited, go and sit down at the lowest place, so that when your host comes, he may say to you, 'Friend, move up higher'; then you will be honored in the presence of all who sit at the table with you. For all who exalt themselves will be humbled, and those who humble themselves will be exalted."

He said also to the one who had invited him, "When you give a luncheon or a dinner, do not invite your friends or your brothers and sisters or your relatives or rich neighbors, in case they may invite you in return, and you would be repaid. But when you give a banquet, invite the poor, the crippled, the lame, and the blind. And you will be blessed because they cannot repay you, for you will be repaid at the resurrection of the righteous."

The Word made flesh dwells among us. **Full of grace and truth.**



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*Worship Notes: Jean-Henri d'Anglebert succeeded his teacher Jacques Champion de Chambonnières as main harpsichordist to King Louis XIV. Perhaps the most sophisticated of the French *clavecinistes*, d'Anglebert's original music, arrangements and transcriptions are filled with ornamentation, both conventional and innovative.

Ennemond Gautier (c. 1575 – 1651) was a French lutenist and composer. He is considered one of the great masters of the 17th century French lutenist school. His *chaconne* heard this morning was transcribed for keyboard by Jean-Henri d'Anglebert.

God's Li'l Acre Winter Shelter At Faith Lutheran Church

Congregational Advisory Meeting Sunday, Sept. 14, following worship

Faith has been asked to host an overnight shelter this winter, in cooperation with God's Li'l Acre, the Lake City Partners day shelter in Lake City. This would be primarily a sleeping place, not a dinner shelter.

Sleeping space would be provided for 24 guests, who would be known, registered clients of God's Li'l Acre. This would NOT be a low-barrier, emergency shelter, but rather a sustained, winter-long commitment to people who are on the path to permanent shelter/housing.

Faith has been asked to host the shelter throughout the winter—from Mid-November through Mid-March. Lake City Partners would "rent" the space—giving Faith adequate payment to cover all heating and utility costs. Lake City Partners would also provide all staff. Guests would be in the building from 8 pm until 6:30 am, with custodial staff cleaning the space and grounds before 8 am, so that existing Faith tenants would be well accommodated.

Faith and other churches would still have opportunity, perhaps once a week, to prepare a meal for the guests.

Please come, learn more, and participate in this congregational advisory meeting on **Sunday September 14, following worship.**
